RE: Letter of support for the Central European University

Dear HE President Ader,

The International Drug Policy Consortium (IDPC) is writing to express solidarity with the Central European University (CEU). We are a network of over 170 non-government organisations around the world promoting open and objective debate on drug policy. IDPC is concerned about Bill T/14686 amending Act CCIV of 2011 on national higher education, accepted by the Hungarian Parliament on April 4, 2017. The Bill renders CEU's continued operations in Budapest virtually impossible and strikes a severe blow against the academic freedom that enables all universities, including those in Hungary, to flourish.

Furthermore, the Bill raises significant legal and constitutional concerns. As a result, we respectfully urge you to refrain from signing the Bill and to refer it to the Constitutional Court of Hungary on the following grounds, among others:

- The law limits academic freedom, the right to education and cultural rights by requiring foreign higher education institutions to operate in Hungary based on a binding international agreement, and
- The law further limits rights and freedoms when it requires foreign higher education institutions with a campus in Hungary to provide higher education programs in their country of origin as well.

In the 25 years since it was founded by a group that included then President of Hungary Arpad Goncz and then President of Czechoslovakia Vaclav Havel, Central European University has established itself as a private international university with a global reputation for teaching and research in the social sciences and humanities. It is an invaluable site of education on evidence-based public policy processes, critical to democratic governance frameworks respecting the rule of law, particularly on topics with wide-ranging social impact such as drug policy, in which many members of the IDPC global network have benefited as students and contributed as teachers.
