<p>Cafe Gargarin</p> <p>Garnisonsgasse 24, 1090 Wien</p>	<p>Pay what you like vegan/vegetarian café. They make sure that products are sourced from human, ecological, and politically acceptable sources and obtain parts of their products from existing agricultural collectives. Their cuisine uses mainly regional and seasonal ingredients and avoids pre-processed food as much as possible. They operate by a fair price policy. This means, that the free prices for drinks and meals are within an affordable range and. The Gargarin tries to demonstrate the possibility of an alternative model of economic coexistence. The idea of free prices means you can pay a fair price in accordance with personal financial means and satisfaction as well as considerations of the "value" of what is eaten. For many people, the Gargarin represents a second living room. Guests often visit it like a second living room, meet friends, get to know people, or simply stay happy on their own, with their nose in a book.</p>
<p>Deewan</p> <p>Liechtensteinstraße 10, 1090 Wien</p>	<p>The Viennese Deewan is a well-known hot spot Among students. You can help yourselves at the buffet and pay as much as you can and want. they serve Pakistani cuisine such as various curries with and without meat. They also always have a vegan alternative. The desserts are also very delicious. You can also stay longer and read their Books and/or play games as they have comfortable seating. Their model of "pay what you can" has been in place since 2005! It is a nice example of how mutual giving can work well.</p>
<p>AAI Mensa + Café Afro</p> <p>Türkenstraße 3, 1090 Wien</p>	<p>Not far from the Juridicum, University of Vienna's main campus, and main university building, the cafeteria (in German "Mensa") of the Afro-Asian Institute is a welcoming alternative. If you want to eat cheap and fast, this is the right place - you'll get a generous amount of oriental hospitality on top of it. A menu consists of soup, main course, and salad or dessert and costs around 6 €. The food is halal and there is always something for vegetarians. You can also visit the Café Afro, where you can enjoy a chessboard, newspaper and drink aromatic tea and eat a meal as well.</p>
<p>Sägewerk</p> <p>Währinger Str. 21, 1090 Wien Mariahilfer Str. 47, 1060 Wien</p>	<p>This restaurant is a "Bauklotzlokal" in Vienna for a while now, which falls into the category of "hourly and inexpensive". The main idea of Sägewerk is that you order the basic burger, pizza, salad, toast, Pfandl, pasta, egg dishes, or potato gratin, and you check off what you want to add. Also, a bonus: it is open 365 days a year from 11.00 am to 02.00 am.</p>
<p>Pizzeria Mafiosi</p> <p>Reindorfqasse 15, 1150 Wien</p>	<p>The value for your money at Pizzeria Mafiosi is great, as huge pizzas cost between 3-6 €. It is a family business with a nice and warm atmosphere. It is a favorite amongst Austrian students.</p>

<p>TÜWI</p> <p>Peter-Jordan-Straße 76, 1190 Wien</p> <p><i>Closed until Nov. 5th</i></p>	<p>The TÜWI aims to be an open space in which everyone can feel comfortable. This is why there is a sign above the bar which says TÜWI does not want racist and sexist behavior. This means that foreign, gay, or otherwise discriminatory jokes are not allowed.</p>
<p>Curry Insel</p> <p>Lenaugasse 4, 1080 Wien</p>	<p>Food from Sri Lanka at a bargain price. In addition to many meat curries, there is a daily selection of delicious vegetable curries starting at 2.60 euros. If you are vegan, this is worth visiting.</p>
<p>U.S.W. Beisl</p> <p>Laudongasse 10, 1080 Wien</p>	<p>U.S.W. stands for “und so weiter” which means “and so on” or “etc.” Every Sunday after 6 pm, if you consume €5,- worth of beverages (like a soda for 1,40), you get a free meal, such as Schweinsbraten mit Knödel or Käsespätzle, etc. The atmosphere is also super cozy!</p>
<p>Food Coops</p> <p><i>Various locations in Vienna</i></p>	<p>Vienna is home to many food coops. A FoodCoop (Food Cooperative) is an association of people and households that purchase organic products directly from local farms, market gardens, beekeepers, etc. in a self-organized manner. Historical predecessors are the consumer cooperatives of the nineteenth century or producer-consumer communities.</p>
<p>Fair-Teller</p> <p><i>Various locations in Vienna</i></p>	<p>Food sharing places. Different restaurants and cafes offer fridges with food that you can take that people ‘share’. People will post on this platform if they are planning to share food and put it in the fridges at these locations.</p>

<p>Kostnixladen Wien</p> <p>Ratschkygasse 14, 1120 Wien</p> <p>Entrance around the corner of <i>Erlgasse</i></p>	<p>What is it?</p> <p>In the Kostnix shop, you can "shop" without money. You can come by and take things you might need without any obligation to pay anything (you can pay through voluntary donations for running costs). You can also drop off things that are lying around unused in your home and that you've been wanting to get rid of anyway. In principle, the Kostnix shop is a storage room for things that are given away and passed on for free. You can find books, clothes, videos, CDs, dishes, household articles, electrical appliances, shoes, and much more.</p> <p>Mission:</p> <p>The aim is to make a direct contribution to a more self-determined life, to help reduce economic constraints in the short term and help bridge the gap between social classes.
